In those days there was no king in Israel; all the people did what was right in their own eyes.
Judges 17:6 (NRSVA)

Last week at our Circuit staff meeting, Rev Jenny quoted these words from Judges. She paired them with the quote from Professor Chris Whitty, 'The problem is, if I increase my risk, I increase everyone's risk'

These are again difficult times. Two of our local Oadby restaurants have been closed because of their failure to follow the rules. The comments from some people carry implicit racist attitudes: 'they' would do that wouldn't they? Yet others defend them: 35 sober people enjoying a curry, well spread out in a well-ventilated building is surely less risky than far more people crowded into Wetherspoons? Yes, I'm sure there are other pubs, some following the rules more closely than others. I name that one in particular because it was the one which I saw most aggressively accused, and also because it is the brand whose name generates its own set of prejudices.

Anecdotally, I'm aware of at least one other local place linked to infections, but I choose not to name it; not least because we can all inadvertently infect others irrespective of how well we follow rules – if indeed that is what happened.

We venture to our nearest shop and find that there are still people who aren't wearing masks. Yes I know – for some people that is right and vital. We are all experts in this and in the stresses of these times we not only want to do our own thing but we have no patience with those who aren't following our interpretation of the rules.

Even the Government acknowledge that setting different rules in different areas is leading to confusion. Worse, that confusion undermines confidence, and without confidence, compliance will be low.

This is the nature of the times we live in. How do we find patience and love in these times?

How can we be Christ-like when we are fearful and confused?
