Dear Friends,

There are sometimes pivotal moments. Times where a single event catches our imagination. It may yet be the that murder of Sarah Everard is such a moment.

The death of George Floyd triggered conversations about racism which were long overdue, but it wasn't entirely clear why that particular brutal murder, amongst so many, became such a rallying point for us to have conversations which should have happened long ago.

The public mourn with the family and friends of Sarah Everard. We acknowledge that the specific circumstances of her death are as unusual as they are shocking. Yet we must also acknowledge the extent to which they are part of a wider structure of fear which most women face, and which is itself built on the kind of prejudices many men hold.

Many of those prejudices have been reinforced by the Church through the ages, and we need to repent that some of those failings persist.

I often listen to the Radio 4 service on Sunday morning, and this week I was struck by the interpretation of the words from John 4 which I quote above. I suspect that most Christians automatically hear those words in the same way in which I've always heard them: this is an immoral woman who is alone because she is shunned by everyone as a result of her lifestyle. Yet, I was challenged. Surely, if we simply read the words without prejudice, this could just as easily be a woman who has had a tragic life. How many times has she been widowed? How many times has she been cast out by men who have power to exploit her? How fragile is her situation now when she lives with a man but does not have the limited protection which marriage affords?

I'm forced to reflect again about the ways my prejudices are contributing to this problem.

Jesus valued this woman regardless of her status in that society. He listened to her. He shared, uniquely with her, truths that we continue to proclaim today.

How do we become a place of safety and sanctuary? A people committed to fighting for justice?
